PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT 1987-88

It is my pleasure to present the Annual Report for 1987-88 for the Zonta Club of Perth, Northern Suburbs.

This has indeed been a milestone year for we have reached the magical target of 35 members set by the Membership Committee at the beginning of last year. In the past there has often been talk of a 'comfortable' membership, one in which the club can afford to have members on leave or travel overseas. What a wonderful feeling it is to have arrived there at last! Congratulations to members of the Membership Committee on your sterling efforts.

The 1987-88 year was significant in other ways too. Our club was invited to host the Western Australian Area 6 Seminar held on June 20th, 1987. What an undertaking that was! The theme "Serving the Purpose for Zonta through Leadership, Awareness and Action" attracted three outstanding keynote speakers. The six Awareness sessions were led by women who are highly respected for their work in the community. There were 74 participants at the Seminar, including 54 Zontians.

It was a delight to have Val Sarah, District 16 Governor and Elizabeth Harris, Area 6 Vice Director attend the Seminar. They contributed to a greater Zonta understanding with their interesting and thought-provoking addresses.

Maggie Schmiedte (nee McComb) represented our club at the Area 6 Workshop held in Alice Springs and subsequently presented a full report in which she urged us to RECRUIT, RECEIVE and RETAIN new members.

Lucy Bohan, Nancy Pilkington and I represented the Zonta Club of Perth, Northern Suburbs, at the District 16 Conference held in Adelaide, September 24-28, 1987. It was an exhilarating experience and we returned to Perth weighed down with Conference papers brimming full of ideas for Zonta action. Valuable working tools included the Networking File No. 2, a Membership Committee Chairman's guide, Public Relations Committee guidelines, and ideas for the Status of Women Committee. All were distributed to the appropriate members.

The work achieved by the 1987 Committees was outstanding. Following the 1986 Christmas recess our members returned to their first meeting full of energy and Zonta zeal. The Board capitalized on this enthusiasm and decided to restructure the Zonta year and form new committees immediately. We felt that the prescribed planning, according to the Manual of Procedures, suited the northern hemisphere admirably, but not us southerners with our long hot summer holidays.

Consultation with Bobbie Porter, Vice Area 6 Director proved very positive and the proposed change appeared to be within the Zonta bylaws. Committee meetings were convened and Chairmen reported to the next meeting on their plans and aspirations for the forthcoming calendar year. The Programme Committee took notes and was able to formulate a very impressive programme, incorporating the many and varied suggestions put forward by the Committees.

The new arrangement has been well received, with none of the traditional disruption mid-year to form new committees in June.

The Committee structure is the heart and soul of any progressive Zonta club. I am happy to report that all the aims and objectives set by the Committee Chairmen in 1987 have been reached and in many cases surpassed. I will not pre-empt Committee reports which Chairmen will give tonight but congratulate them sincerely on a job well done.

Out of the possible 35 goals listed in the Club Achievement Award Form, 30 have been achieved. As Zontians we certainly don't need awards for our work, but the Achievement Form provides a good guide to what we should be achieving each blennium and I congratulate each and every one of you on your efforts.

In all, our programmes have reflected a great desire to be innovative in Zonta planning and thinking. Personally, I have enjoyed observing the wonderful way our members have worked harmoniously, pulling together with each new endeavour. Your warm and happy working spirit and willingness to give 'up and above' made it a great pleasure and privilege to be associated with you in Zonta fellowship.

I wish to personally thank our secretary, Kaye Metaxas, whose unfailing guidance and good counsel has been greatly valued by me. Her efficient minute taking and effective communication system have been quite remarkable and appreciated by every member. In her role as Club Archivist, Kaye has put considerable time and effort into organising and filing the history of our Club - an important aspect of Club records.

To the outgoing Board members, a sincere thank you for your significant contributions to our club. The fruits of your labours are there for everybody to see.

To the club members at large - it has been an honour to be your President for the last two years and I thank you sincerely, for your wonderful support.

FELLOWSHIP AND ATTENDANCE COMMITTEE

Ten official meetings were held between March 1987 and February 1988. Two meetings were held in-house i.e. Amelia Earhart and the October Training/Information evening.

A total of 188 members attended meetings during this period demonstrating an average of 18.8 members only attended each meeting.

Attendance figures were significantly increased by the 132 guests which came to our meetings throughout the year. The average of 13.2 guests each meeting accounted for 41% of attendances over the year.

Comparison with last year's figures show a similar number of members attending meetings but shows a large increase of guests which has led to an increase in membership. The current membership now stands at 35.

The problem of members and guests not providing notice of nonattendance still persists. The new system of guests returning the RSVP slip attached to their invitation with the dinner fee has reduced the expensive cost to the club of meals provided for those not attending. All members who fail to notify non-attendance are now sent accounts for the cost of dinner.

Observation City Hotel has proved to be a continuing success. The accommodation is excellent and the food and beverage provided are of a high standard.

Chris Rushworth (Chairman) Maureen Gibbs Victoria Wadley Alma Dempsey Representatives from each of the four Zonta Clubs in Western Australia make up membership of the Intra-city Committee. Although two members can be nominated from each club, attendance at meetings usually comprises Bobbie Porter (P), Sue Jarvis (SP), Bev Scott (DR), Lucy Bohan (NS). Arrangements will be made in due course to include membership from the new Club at Bunbury. A change of venue or a second location may then be necessary.

- Objectives: The objectives of this Committee are to promote liaison and closer relationships between clubs in Western Australia and their members, by arranging and encouraging appropriate functions including joint fundraising. (On the matter of fund-raising, clubs will in future receive credit for the amounts raised.)
- The quarterly newsletter 'Wazz Buzz' has been discontinued because each of the clubs now produces a similar bulletin.
- 3. Meetings were held at one to three monthly intervals at the Alexander Library coffee shop. However in a recent review of the Committee's role and function, it was decided that in future meetings will be held at bimonthly intervals, and special meetings as required. Meetings in 1988 are scheduled for 23 February, 12 April, 14 June and 11 October.
- 4. The Zonta Foundation Anniversary Dinner organised by Darling Range Club, was held at the historic Rose and Crown Hotel Guildford. The guest speaker was Sister Veronica Brady, and the Founders Award for community achievement was presented to Dr Fiona Stanley for her work in maternal and child welfare. The Zonta Club of Perth, Northern Suburbs, nominated Dr Stanley for the award.
- 4.1 In future, for the benefit of all concerned, nominations for the Founders Award will be requested by 31 July each year. As well each club will be reminded annually of the criteria for consideration and selection.
- 5. The Zonta Rose Garden, a joint club effort, has not yet materialised. The reason is that the Kings Park Board has not replied to the application for siting the Garden at the Pioneer Women's Memorial. The matter is being pursued.
- 6. Evidence of other inter-club activity during the year includes:
- 6.1 The Edwardian Afternoon at Lesmurdie organised by Darling Range Club.
- 6.2 The International Night at the Hellenic Community Centre in Northbridge, organised by Perth, Northern Suburbs Club. This ethnic evening was very successful and has stimulated another club to arrange a similar function.
- 6.3 Area 6 Seminar, 20 June 1987, organised by Northern Suburbs and attended and opened by Elizabeth Harris (Area 6 Director). The theme: Leadership, Awareness and Action evoked thoughtful keynote addresses and comment. The subsequent Resolutions Committee with inter-club representation formulated a number of recommendations which have yet to be considered and acted upon both jointly and individually by the clubs concerned.
- 7. Bicentennial Project 1988: At a special meeting in early January 1988 a submission was prepared and sent to the Bicentennial Authority. A request was made for a grant of \$1,000 (the maximum available) to arrange a BICENTENNIAL THANKSGIVING DINNER in late September 1988. A joint club committee would organise this function.

 The special guests to be feted and honoured at this dinner would be 50 unsung achievers that is women from all walks of life who have contributed positively in some way to the community but have never been recognised for their efforts. These women will in effect epitomise the great silent majority of Australian women over the 200 years of our history, who 'far from the maddening crowd kept the noiseless tenor of their way.'

INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS

The International Relations Committee has made contact with eight overseas clubs with a view to establishing them as our Friendship Clubs through Operation Friendship. Two have accepted our invitation, Jakarta, Indonesia and Loveland, U.S.A. Initial correspondence regarding our general club activities has been passed on to those two clubs with a view to encouraging goodwill and unity between our countries.

An International Fund has been established to assist members to attend Workshops and Conventions and already members have been able to benefit from this Fund.

The theme for our July meeting was "Youth Speaks". Five international exchange students from Japan, U.S.A. and Scandanavia, as well as two Australian students were our guest speakers and all gave excellent addresses.

Through the "Open House" programme our club played host to visitors from the United States.

International Relations was highlighted at the May Area 6 Seminar conducted by our club, when guest speakers Diana Buchanan and Annalisa Maine-Emamy spoke at Awareness sessions on 'Third-world Women and their Needs' and 'Equal opportunity for non-English speaking background women - myth or reality?' respectively.

Our Club became a member of the United Nations Association, receiving the regular newsletter 'Outreach'. Guest speakers during the year were, Diana Buchanan from the United Nations Association of W.A. and Glenys Bolleter (Overseas Service Bureau), who described the many facets of the Bureau and how well Zonta's commitment to UNIFEM followed the aims and objectives of the Overseas Service.

To celebrate United Nations Day (24th October) club members experienced a truly International evening with the Greek community. The function was held at the Hellenic Community Centre. The Hellenic Ladies Auxiliary hosted a most enjoyable evening, organised in conjunction with the Intracity Committees. Members were treated to Greek dancing, a visit to the Church, costume display, history of the Greek community in W.A. and some delicious Greek cuisine, providing members with the opportunity to learn more of the cultures and customs of this ethnic group through the Awareness Programme.

All ten goals set out in our 'Aims and Goals' for 1987 were achieved.

STATUS OF WOMEN COMMITTEE

February 1987 saw the Padbury Child Care Centre commence operating. The Centre is catering for nearly 100 children with 43 children being cared for on a full-time basis.

Play equipment in the form of a sand pit and a Quadro modular unit which can be used indoors and outdoors by toddlers to 12 years old, has been funded by our club.

On June 10, members visited the centre and met the staff who gave them a guided tour of the facilities. A further donation was presented by the members to the centre.

Pat Hassett, Director of the centre was a recent guest at one of our monthly meetings.

Thank you Dellas Clements for your input and direction over the past year with this ongoing club commitment.

A seminar organised, co-ordinated and hosted by Northern Suburbs Zontians took place on June 20 and looked at the needs of a broad spectrum of women. Titled 'Serving the Purpose for Zonta, through Leadership, Awareness and Action' we were inspired and challenged by the keynote speakers Dame Raigh Roe, Kath French and Dr Linda Dann. Awareness sessions were lead by invited community leaders in the areas of aboriginal women, elderly women, third-world women, equal opportunity for girls and women and non-English speaking women.

A scholarship has been established to further the education of women. Kathleen Fitzpatrick is the first recipient of the Status of Women Scholarship. As a mature-age student in the Department of Information and Library Studies at Curtin University, the scholarship will pay for Kathleen's tertiary admittance and guild fees.

Thank you to Kay Poustie for helping to locate the recipient.

Zonta Club of Perth, Northern Suburbs is continuing to support the International Zonta Project UNIFEM helping women in underdeveloped countries.

Closer to home, our Zontians are supporting women in their local community through membership and material contributions to the Zonta Refuge.

On many fronts Perth, Northern Suburbs Zontians are helping to improve the status of women.
