Sharing has been a wonderful feature of our Club and the Zonta year commenced with a leadership workshop at Dunsborough attended by many members who enjoyed the learning process and the fellowship. The primary goal set for our Club was service combined with fellowship and fun. INTERCITY

Representatives from the six Western Australian Zonta Clubs met every second month during the 1992-93 period and together promoted closer relationships through the sharing of Zontian ideals and objectives. Attendance at the meetings was always high and the presence of members from the two country clubs was greatly appreciated. Meetings were further enhanced by the attendance of District 23 Governor, Bobbie Porter, and Area 3 Director, Kay Poustie. A recommendation from the 1991 Intercity Committee that the incoming representatives from each club include the President, gave Kay a valuable communication opportunity which she used to her great advantage.

Several important Area 3 functions were successfully planned and coordinated through the Intercity Committee. On May 16, 1992, Dunsborough Club hosted a Leadership Training Session for Office Bearers and all attendees expressed their appreciation of the valuable insights gained at this workshop.

The Area 3 Workshop for 1992 was held at the Inglewood Autumn Centre and hosted by the Perth Club. The day's programme invited Zontians to begin the day with a healthy breakfast and then to participate in activities related to stress management. The presenter, Nick Randall, charmed us all with his easy manner and sensible approach to dealing with the pressures of modern living.

The Founders Day Dinner, held at the Celtic Club on November 7, was also hosted by Perth and proved a memorable occasion for the Perth Northern Suburbs Club. The recipients of the two awards announced on the night were both nominated by our Club. Leila Hoffman, librarian, historian and champion of women's equity issues in the early 1960's, was declared "Zonta Woman of Achievement for 1992". Gillian Wong, a gracious and intelligent Year 12 student from Mt Lawley Senior High School, received the Area 3 award for "Young Woman in Public Affairs". Both awards were organised by the Intercity Committee using guidelines employed internationally in Zonta.

The final function of the 92-93 Intercity calendar was the recognition of International Women's Day. Perth Northern Suburbs Club held a general meeting, attended by 54 Zontians. The guest speaker for the evening was Mrs Lucy Brooks who spoke on the life of women in South America as compared to life of women in Australia.

Her vivid description of the value of the work left us in no doubt that we should contribute funds to aid this organisation, and Operation Rainbow is now part of our annual budget.

Dr Veronica Brady spoke on her life and the role of women in education and some of the difficulties encountered by them in pursuing their career in this field.

September was our annual Youth Awards and we heard from the young awardees about their contributions to the community. Always a stimulating and exciting evening.

United Nations evening in October was celebrated with a talk by Pauline Shaw on her life as a child in Kenya. A very interesting insight into a vastly different lifestyle.

Our December Christmas Party gave us the opportunity to present the proceeds of the raffle to the Zonta Refuge and to Princess Margaret Hospital.

January saw us gathered in Joan Orchard's home for our Amelia Earhart function where President Gillian gave us a talk on Dr Helen Pearce, the Zontian responsible for setting up the A/E Fellowships.

Our February think tank brought forward excellent ideas for fund raising projects and suggestions on suitable recipients of our service funds.

Perth Northern Suburbs was host for the International Women's Day celebration dinner in March and Lucy Brooks gave an excellent view into the lives of Chilean women (from a midwife's point of view).

Ted Wilkes from the committee of the Year of the Indigenous People was our guest speaker for April but was unable to complete his speech and will return later in the year.

Thanks to Margaret Field's well researched citation for the 1992 Woman of Achievement Award our nominee was the Area 3 winner. It was pleasing to see Jewish magazine "The Maccabean" reproduce the citation and head the article "Zonta honours Leila Hoffman".

Marcia's 100 word article on the Youth Awards, as part of Area 3's display at the June 1992 Hong Kong Convention, publicised our Club's recognition of the contribution of youth in our society.

Dawn Newman's competent support produced the 1992 Handbook together with photographic input by Joan Orchard. We can be very proud of Dawn's professional result, the best Club Handbook I've seen!

1993 will see the erection of our Zonta roadside signs, ordered through Zonta Club of Frankston, to be affixed onto poles with kind permission of Rotary, together with their symbol.

The "Zontapreneur" provided news to our Club members, other Area 3 clubs, District Office Bearers, Headquarters, our Twinning Club in Malden, Massachusetts, and was produced in July, October and March. Thanks go to Marcia for her expert editorial input and also other members for their contributions, especially new member profiles, a great way of getting to know all about you. We have huge potential for budding writers in our Club!

Supporting a TAFE scholarship this year gave us another opportunity to publicise Zonta on the presentation night when our name and banner gained valuable recognition of our community support by the educators, councillors, other service clubs and all who were at the Carine Campus presentation.

SPECIAL PROJECTS

Another long outstanding matter was the Zonta plaque for the International Airport Arrivals Hall which Alison has mentioned in her report. I was finally able to persuade Linda Dann of the Zonta Club of Perth to use her telephone number as a contact. Through a little "coercion" a friend of mine kindly designed the Jarrah board and affixed the plaque which was then delivered to the Airport. If any Zontian is travelling in from overseas take a minute to check it out (Linda may even given you a lift home!)

Club records are something which can be time consuming to maintain so I have taken on the job of keeping our photographic album up to date, although at the pace Alison sets with the PR Committee, this is some task! However, I believe it is an important part of the Club's history and will be an excellent reference for the future.

Likewise, the Club's fund-raising activities/service recipients should also be recorded for posterity and I have recently researched the financial records in order to set up a register which will tell us how and to whom we have distributed funds over our lifetime. This will also tell us what percentage has been paid to International projects, bearing in mind that we are committed to distributing at least one-third to overseas activities.

To gain some experience for Northern Suburbs I have also sat on the Zonta Club of Perth's SOM Committee set up to form the Zonta Club of Peel Region and this has given me a valuable insight into the work of Organization and Extension. Apart from these specific undertakings I am also available to assist any of the Committee Chairmen whenever there are overloads and lend support to the President which goes without saying. Being a committee of one, I can thoroughly recommend it for any other Past Presidents!

STATUS OF WOMEN & INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS

The Committee comprised Cheryl Fairclough (Chairman 1992), Yvonne Cole, Robina Wright and Lou Morrison (Chairman 1993).

The Committee's major project has been the Young Woman in Public Affairs Award (YWPAA). The award comprises a \$300 bursary towards university study costs and is designed to encourage women to participate in decision-making in their communities to benefit both men and women. Applicants must be in Year 12 and intending to work towards a career in public life. The selection process involves a written application and statement by the applicant, a reference from an adult, an official transcript of school grades, and an interview with the Zonta selection panel.

Under the able leadership of Cheryl Fairclough, Chairman of this committee until her move to the eastern states at the end of 1992, five young women were interviewed by the panel for the 1992 Northern Suburbs YWPAA. Gillian Wong, who was preparing for the TEE at Mt Lawley High School during 1992, became the Club's awardee. She is an outstanding orator and student and

intends to work as a barrister defending those mistreated by the legal system. The Club was delighted that Gillian went on to become the Area winner.

The 1993 YWPAA will be finalised in the first half of the year in order to fit more easily into the Year 12 academic year. Applications are now being sought. Selection will take place during May/June by a panel comprising the Committee members plus the assistance of Jean Wyder and Nerrida Porteous. The Award will be presented at the Club's July meeting.

The Committee is investigating the possibility of awarding the Lucy Bohan Bursary on a needs basis in the faculty of nursing. Negotiations are currently underway with appropriate institutions.

Two areas of focus for the Committee during the rest of 1993 are international relations and the Year of Indigenous People. Following the Committee's May meeting, friendship letters will be sent from the Northern Suburbs to Zonta Clubs across the world.
