STATUS OF WOMEN, INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS, UNITED NATIONS & AMELIA EARHART

The members of the Status of Women Committee continued to enjoy friendship, fellowship and challenge as we focused together on numerous projects throughout the 1996-97 year. Our membership comprised Sue Brennan, Marion Brown, Margaret Field, Danielle Gallegos, Robina Wright and Lou Morrison (Chairman). Meetings took place on a regular basis, usually each month.

The Young Women in Public Affairs Award again drew strong applicants. The Club winner was Demelza Needham from Mt Lawley High School. In 1995 as State President of Youth World Vision and traveled to Vietnam as part of a youth team, to witness first hand a nation in which World Vision had been active and involved in development project work. She is now undertaking a year in Bremen, Germany as an exchange student before starting university studies next year.

In March the 1995 YWIPA winner, Sasha Moss, was awarded her \$300 bursary for her university studies and addressed the Club on her experience as an exchange student in Belgium. She left no doubt that she is a most articulate and talented young woman and indeed worthy of the Award.

The Committee welcomes changes, which have been made to the Young Women in Public Affairs Award application papers. We believe that the revised structure gives a more appropriate opportunity for the applicants to express their strengths.

The Lucy Bohan awardee was presented with \$500 at a Club dinner and the search for a 1997 recipient is again under way. The awardee is a person who is in either 2nd or 3rd year nursing at Edith Cowan University and who requires financial assistance in order to complete their degree.

The Committee, on behalf of the Club, nominated Dr. Patrice Cooke for the Woman of Achievement Award. Dr. Cooke has an extraordinary record of service to the community through her work as a counselor and social worker. The Committee feels that her work is that of an unsung hero and that she is worthy of nomination for the Australia Day Honours.

We continued contact with overseas Clubs in Northern America, Asia, Africa and Europe. It has become unclear which Clubs are twinning and which are friendship Clubs; currently we are working to clarify the confusion. Contact has continued with Anne Helm's school in South Africa and we are awaiting a response from Bryce Courtney re a possibility that he may be able to provide a channel for us through which to send materials to Anne's school.

STATUS OF WOMEN REPORT CONT'D

Our 2nd Annual Health Seminar was held in the latter half of 1996, again at the Scarborough Civic Centre. Dr. Gwen Leavesley and our own Danielle Gallegos addressed the issue of menopause and sexuality. The Seminar was well attended and very well received by Club members and many from the wider community.

Our Committee is currently looking at developing a slightly different concept related to health over the next 18 months. Danielle is investigating the feasibility of a woman's health and exercise expo in conjunction with Women's Sport West. So far indications are that we may have a very creative and exciting project taking shape for 1998. This project will replace the annual health seminar for 1997.

The Mentor Scheme, which marries with a commitment by the Committee to the development of literacy, was formalized this year. A register of Club members who are available to mentor migrant women has been developed. The Migrant Centre has worked with us to develop the Mentor Scheme and now mentor links are channeled through Margaret Field. Several mentor links have already taken place. The aim of the Scheme is to support newly arrived migrant women in a variety of ways whilst acknowledging that Club members have varied amounts of time which they are able to give to the Scheme. Our Committee will closely monitor the progress and success of the Scheme over the next year.

A Self Defence programme for girls has been developed by Marion Brown who will run a pilot during Term 2, 1997 with 20 Greenwood High School Year 12 girls taking part in self defence classes sponsored by our Club. The 9-week pilot programme run with an instructor from the Bushi Kempo Ju-Jitsu Academy has already attracted media attention without Marion or Committee members even trying — and before it has run! We are, however, taking care not to respond in such a way that would add fuel to the media hype generated over recent abductions of young women in Perth.

The members of our Committee continue to enjoy the challenges, which we have created and hope to create in the future. Again, it has been both a pleasure and honor for me to work with each member of the Committee.
